THE 5TH EMERGING RESEARCH PARADIGMS

IN BUSINESS AND SOCIAL SCIENCES (ERPBSS-2020) CONFERENCE

Middlesex University Dubai successfully hosted the Emerging Research Paradigms in Business and Social Sciences (ERPBSS) conference at Middlesex University Dubai on the Dubai EXPO 2020 themes of Sustainability, Mobility, and Opportunity, from 14th to 16th January 2020. Building upon its previous editions' success, this unique fifth edition provided a platform for academics to discuss new concepts, progressive methodologies, and innovative practices in line with the conference themes and sub-themes that included Inclusivity, Tolerance, Empowerment, Creativity, Happiness, and Innovation. This event saw over 180 delegates, including Researchers, Practitioners, and Professionals from various disciplines, representing over 60 universities and institutions from the UAE and around the world.

The introductory morning of ERPBSS 2020 included inspiring keynotes from Hugh Ragg, Senior Manager Learning & Development at Expo 2020 Dubai, and Janya Chanchaichujit, Director Logistics and Business Analytics Center of Excellence - Walailak University Thailand. Across the three days of the conference, over 90 research papers and case studies were presented along with several plenary and panel sessions and student poster presentations. The delegates communicated their discoveries while securing a meaningful discussion with other professionals from different fields to address the increasingly complex global and local challenges sustainably. The conference wrapped up with an excellent and industry panel stimulating session Sustainability, and a ceremony that presented delegates with 'best research paper' and 'best student poster' awards.



MDX DUBAI FACULTY HAVE BEEN INVOLVED IN A RANGE OF COVID-19 RELATED RESEARCH OVER THE PAST YEAR. IN THIS ARTICLE, SOME OF THESE RESEARCHERS DISCUSS THEIR STUDIES - WHAT THEY ARE ABOUT AND WHY THEY ARE IMPORTANT.

NEELOFER MASHOOD (MIDDLESEX UNIVERSITY DUBAI BUSINESS SCHOOL)

THE IMPACT OF THE PANDEMIC ON THE PSYCHOLOGICAL CONTRACT

What is your research about?

The pandemic has severely affected the employment relationship. The psychological contract is the employer and employee's unwritten expectations in the employment relationship. These are powerful and have a substantial impact on employee and organisational productivity as it affects engagement; job satisfaction; turnover etc. Many factors can be managed to keep the psychological contract intact, but several are beyond organisations' influence. It would be interesting to identify these factors and how they can be used as an opportunity by organisations to enhance employee engagement and eventually organisational performance in this crisis.

What interested you in this topic?

I am very keen to research the psychological contract as it is still an under researched HR area. In the pandemic, it is also one concept that has been severely affected.

DR. SUDIPA MAJUMDAR (MIDDLESEX UNIVERSITY DUBAI BUSINESS SCHOOL) AND DR. RACHNA BANERJEE (ASSISTANT PROFESSOR, HIGHER COLLEGES OF TECHNOLOGY)

RELATIONSHIP BETWEEN STOCK INDEX, OIL PRICE AND FDI — DOES NON-OIL DIVERSIFICATION MATTER FOR THE UAE STOCK MARKET?

What is your research about?

UAE has rapidly developed into one of the leading global financial hubs, with significant reforms in its stock exchanges. Our data suggests a strong positive association between stock index and FDI, based on a Vector Autoregression model, highlighting the UAE's non-oil diversification program's success. Our extension of the model to capture the Covid-19 situation reveals that the UAE Stock Index dived below the predicted lower bound in March 2020 due to the pandemic and shows a remarkable recovery during the April-October trades, when prices are seen bouncing back to the model forecast levels.

What interested you in this topic?

It is a one-year research project that has been granted to Dr. Rachna and me by the research center at Abu Dhabi Securities Exchange.

What is your research about?

The Economic and Political Weekly paper deals with the spread of the coronavirus pandemic in the city of Mumbai with the pandemic considered as a local public bad with spillover effects across the wards of the city. Spatial econometric techniques are used to model these spillovers using both cross-section as well as panel data. The main conclusion of the article is that the significant spatial spillover effect across the wards of the city is likely to make the exit from the enforced lockdown a major challenge

What interested you in this topic?

COVID-19 and the associate lockdowns have significant and dire economic consequences. I was interested in studying these consequences.

CHINNU MARY GEORGE (MIDDLESEX UNIVERSITY DUBAI CEI DEPARTMENT) AND SHARON LUKE BABU

ARBITRATE THE NUMBER OF INFECTIONS OF NOVEL CORONAVIRUS WITH DEEP LEARNING

What is your research about?

Coronavirus has affected several thousands of people throughout the globe. The illness is being referred as COVID-19. The virus that propagated to the illness is the SARS-Cov-2. Over the last few months the number of infections has drastically increased. There has been several lock down proposed since the inception of the outbreak. The paper proposes a deep learning approach to determine the number of infections. The data for these are collected daily so that it can be fed to the model for training. Once the model is trained to achieve the accuracy, this is then unitised to arbitrate the number of infections caused.

What interested you in this topic?

The current pandemic needs to be edged out.



MOHAMMAD ALI MERAJ, PROFESSOR AJIT KARNIK, AND PALLAVI KISHORE (MIDDLESEX UNIVERSITY DUBAI BUSINESS SCHOOL)

INVESTIGATING TECHNOLOGY READINESS OF STUDENTS AND FACULTY MEMBERS FOR ADOPTION OF DISTANCE LEARNING: A CASE-STUDY FROM AN INTERNATIONAL BRANCH CAMPUS IN THE UAE

What is your research about?

With the outbreak of Coronavirus (Convid-19) in January 2020, the higher education sector found itself in 'unchartered territory'. In the worst hit countries, schools and higher educational institutions (HEIs) were ordered to close with no students allowed on campuses for weeks. This research setting is a London-based HEI's international branch campus (IBC) operating in the Emirate of Dubai. The university's shutdown constitutes a "natural experiment" and provides a unique context for the study as IBCs, by their very nature, have a high proportion of international students and are expected to maintain the learning experience for their students comparable to that of the home campus. This study aims to examine the preparedness of faculty and students to the adoption of technology to deliver lectures online. The study has obvious links with the Technology Adoption Model, a workhorse model in numerous areas. We seek to investigate the factors that might influence technology adoption among faculty members and students for e-Learning.

The methodology for the study will be as follows. Our literature review will explore the factors that impact the user acceptance of e-Learning. Primary data will be collected from the two key user groups i.e., faculty members and students. We plan to use a mixed methodology to achieve these objectives, beginning with a qualitative phase consisting of in-depth semi-structured conducted interviews via online video-conferencing with a small group of users (N=5-10, for faculty members and students each), to identify the issues faced by them regarding e-Learning. We will use convenience sampling for both qualitative and quantitative

data collection. We will develop our hypotheses using our findings from these interviews and our literature review. Finally, we will use a quantitative study (online survey) (N=250-300) in the early stages of online learning and again after a four/five-week period using comparable questionnaires. We will analyse this data using appropriate software packages (e.g., NVivo, AMOS and SPSS) to test our hypotheses. We will then discuss our findings, their conceptual and managerial implications as well as future research directions.

What interested you in this topic?

As we were forced into a rapid transition to online learning, a number of questions arose about the viability of online learning and how students would accept this mode - especially since they had signed up for an on-campus experience. The idea for this paper emerged as we tried to wrap our head around a variety of perspectives from a range of voices, our own experiences as academics, and the often contradictory or contextually inappropriate suggestions that were available out there.

DENISE ANDRZEJEWSKI, DR. ANITA KASHI, DR. NISHTA LAMBA, MERIAM MELAD (MIDDLESEX UNIVERSITY DUBAI DEPARTMENT OF PSYCHOLOGY)

PROTECTIVE FACTORS OF MENTAL HEALTH DURING LOCKDOWNS & QUARANTINE

What is your research about?

The public health measures employed during the advent of the COVID-19 pandemic left people with unprecedented circumstances such as prolonged quarantine and lockdowns, potentially taking a toll on mental health. This paper explores which demographic, psychological, and behavioral factors serve as protectors against deteriorating mental health during quarantine and lockdowns.

What interested you in this topic?

Data from previous pandemics and outbreaks were mostly collected after the event. The COVID-19 pandemic, however, gave a unique opportunity to gather insights during this historical event.

MATT BROWN (MIDDLESEX UNIVERSITY DUBAI BUSINESS SCHOOL), DR. LYNDA HYLAND PSYCHOLOGY (MIDDLESEX UNIVERSITY DUBAI DEPARTMENT OF PSYCHOLOGY), DR. ALUN EPPS EPPS (ALASALA COLLEGES, DAMMAN, KSA)

PARADIGMS LOST AND GAINED: STAKEHOLDER EXPERIENCES OF CRISIS DISTANCE LEARNING DURING THE COVID-19 PANDEMIC

What is your research about?

Our study explored key school stakeholders' experiences (teachers, children, and parents; n=31) during the Covid-19 period of crisis distance learning. Thematic analysis was conducted on data collected from six discrete focus groups, purposively sampled from a private school in Dubai. Researchers identified three overaching themes, including 'a need for stakeholder support', 'curriculum delivery implications', and 'educational outcomes of crisis distance learning'.

What interested you in this topic?

Distance learning has been typically assessed in previous literature as a matter of choice-a decision made by parents for their child's education. The pandemic-related shift to distance learning was not a choice, and thus there is a considerable dearth of information on how this is transition is experienced. We chose to do an exploratory, qualitative study to gain a nuanced account of how teachers, children, and parents reflected on this transition.

LEANE DIAS (3RD YEAR STUDENT, MIDDLESEX UNIVERSITY DUBAI DEPARTMENT OF PSYCHOLOGY), DENISE ANDRZEJEWSKI (MIDDLESEX UNIVERSITY DUBAI DEPARTMENT OF PSYCHOLOGY)

GROWTH THROUGH CRISIS: ONE YEAR AFTER THE ADVENT OF THE COVID 19 PANDEMIC. THE EFFECT OF COPING STYLES ON POST-TRAUMATIC GROWTH

What is your research about?

As the impact of COVID-19 is vast, it is essential to understand how people may be affected by their coping mechanisms. It would be beneficial to society if we could encourage coping

strategies that lead to post-traumatic growth. This study aims to understand the impact of various coping styles on levels of post-traumatic growth among young adults in the United Arab Emirates.

What interested you in this topic?

All I could see for the past one year were news reports of gloom and doom. Some concern is warranted, but growth is possible even in the darkest of times. I was always interested in studying trauma and post-traumatic growth, and now I hope to study it in a way that helps society come out of the COVID-19 pandemic stronger than we were before.

MARIAM ABONIL (MIDDLESEX UNIVERSITY DUBAI, IFP), DR. ANITA SHRIVASTAVA KASHI AND DR. LYNDA HYLAND (MIDDLESEX UNIVERSITY DUBAI DEPARTMENT OF PSYCHOLOGY)

SURVIVORS, NOT VICTIMS: RESILIENCE AND WELL-BEING IN EXPATRIATE ENTREPRENEURS DURING A GLOBAL CRISIS

What is your research about?

This exploratory qualitative study investigated 12 for-profit expatriate entrepreneurs' entrepreneurial journey in the United Arab Emirates during the COVID-19 global crisis. Data from semi-structured interviews were analysed through thematic analysis (Braun & Clarke, 2006). The data showed themes relating to positive psychology and resilience: gratitude, valuing relationships, and goal-setting. Participants' assessments of crisis-related risk support the challenge model of resilience and emphasise the importance of positive psychology constructs in psychological well-being during a major exogenous crisis.

What interested you in this topic?

Expatriate entrepreneurs can be exposed to crisis-related risk more than 'local' entrepreneurs and who those are not self-employed. We were primarily interested in this topic as past research has shown entreprenurs to have attributes (acceptace of risk, innovators) that could potentially help in managing during the Covid-19 pandemic.

A TIMELY SPECIAL ISSUE ON DIGITAL NOMADISM:

THE NEXUS OF REMOTE WORKING AND TRAVEL DURING COVID-19

Dr. Cody Morris Paris co-edited (with Dr. Inge Hermann, ROC van Amsterdam, Netherlands) a special issue in the SCOPUS and SSCI indexed journal Information Technology & Tourism on Digital Nomadism: The Nexus of Remote Working and Travel Mobility. The issue was published in October 2020 in Volume 22, issue 3. This special issue brings together five papers focused on further deciphering the digital nomad phenomenon. While the call for papers for this special issue and much of the research included was completed prior the COVID-19 pandemic, the special issue engages with some very relatable and timely research questions contributing to the academic inquiry into the interdependence of mobility and technology that will continue to be of fundamental importance for current and future tourism practices.

SPECIAL RESEARCH SEMINARS ON COVID-19

In March 2020, following the outbreak, the weekly Wednesday research seminar series immediately moved online. Also, the research committee took a concerted effort to select the presenters and research topics to fit the ongoing crisis, such as E-learning challenges and opportunities, and COVID-19 spread and its impact on the economy.

Details of the special seminars are as follows:

25 March 2020 - Mohammad Meraj, Prof Ajit Karnik and Pallavi Kishore presented their research findings on the readiness of students and faculty members for adoption of distance learning.

08 April 2020 — Prof Ajit Karnik delivered a seminar on "Statistical Analysis of COVID-19 Data", which addressed the virus's statistical properties, information on total and new confirmed cases, total and new deaths due to the virus and recoveries from the virus. The presentation also investigated the likely factors that explain the progress of the disease across countries.



SREEJITH BALASUBRAMANIAN DELIVERS KEYNOTE SPEECH

AT THE 16TH EAST ASIAN ECONOMIC AND CULTURAL FORUM




Dr. Sreejith Balasubramanian was invited as a keynote speaker at the 16th East Asian Economic and Cultural Forum co-organised by Dong-Eui University, South Korea, Jiaxing University, China, and Middlesex University, UK held on 10th December 2020. The keynote address titled "Examining the Cold Chain Challenges and Solutions for Efficient COVID-19 Vaccine Distribution" focused on the challenges of stringent cold chain requirements of the COVID-19 vaccines. It additionally addressed how technology (especially RFID's, IOTs, Blockchain), supply chain collaboration (manufacturers, carriers, governments, NGO's, hospitals, clinics etc.), and human resources are critical for efficient vaccine delivery.

MIDDLESEX UNIVERSITY RESEARCH

The Student Research Society was launched in 2019 by supportive community of research-aware research-active students. The society aimed to foster a love of research amongst the student body, beyond the classroom. Under the guidance of the Student Research Committee and Sophie Azoury (Chair of the Society), the original founding members of the Society took on roles and responsibilities that reflected their expertise: our skills in graphic design, social media, IT, PR, and of course, research. were all crucial in establishing the Society's presence on campus and online, and in carrying out its activities and events. Building on students' interest, the Society then established its popular 'Cup of Research' events, for informal discussion of research around specific themes each month. Previous themes have included research communication and research teamwork.

CUP OF RESEARCH:

AN INITIATIVE OF THE STUDENT RESEARCH SOCIETY

Middlesex University Dubai's Student Research Society hosted their first virtual 'cup of research' event of the 2020-2021 academic year on 10th December 2020, through Microsoft Teams. The session helped introduce the SRS to new students as well as to continue the conversations on research. The topic was "the applicability and importance of research across various disciplines." Three students from the SRS' student body represented three different disciplines: Nimisha Ajaikumar, Psychology, Ahmed Saleem, Law, and Aditeya Viju Govind, Information Technology. Students focused on the importance of research in their disciplines and a conversation was sparked about how research helped expand each field and connect it to others. The attendees recalled personal experiences about how research helped them expand their own horizons. A conclusion was drawn of the widely underestimated importance of research and how much it helps humanity continuously advance. The conversation left both speakers and participants alike with a greater understanding and appreciation towards research.





STUDENT RESEARCH ASSISTANT SCHEME

The Student Research Scheme (SRA) is an initiative of the Student Research Committee. It aims to provide students with an opportunity to further enhance their research skills under faculty supervision and acquire practical research experience to develop their own academic careers. In the summer of 2020, the policies were updated, and the processes were automated. In 2020 we received 30 applications and out of which 11 students (7 UG and 4 PG) have already been placed to support faculty on ongoing research projects. Senior (2nd year, 3rd year, or postgraduate) students of Middlesex University Dubai and recent Middlesex University Dubai graduates (up to 3 years post-graduation) may apply for the post of Student Research Assistant (SRA), when they are available. To be considered for this post, applicants should have excellent academic records and display a keen interest in gaining research experience. Faculty and students share their SRA scheme experiences:



During summer 2020 I collaborated with my Student Research Assistant Ritaj Alzahri for a systematic literature review. We began by coding the last three years of our Postgraduate dissertations on NVivo. These dissertations are written by educators and provide a unique insight into prominent local issues. Ritaj and I decided to investigate the topic of multilingual challenges in UAE education. It was initially challenging to collaborate remotely via GoToMeeting, but once we had set ourselves clear targets, we soon found the systematic process of SLR lent itself to sorting through journal articles autonomously.

The SRA position allowed me to be a part of research in higher education. Working alongside a lecturer on research was an insightful experience that motivated me to be more involved in the research world. As an education student, I gained valuable academic writing skills that I currently use in my research module, along with research skills in data analysis skills, using programmes like NVivo. I would advise students interested in research to apply for the SRA position next summer.

RITAJ ALZAHRI EDUCATION STUDENT



The Student Research Assistant (SRA) scheme at Middlesex University Dubai enables our students to learn about research beyond the classroom environment. During summer 2020, my colleague Olga Khokhlova and I worked with five research assistants on diverse research topics such as the impact of media-induced trauma during COVID-19, exploring perceptions of marital scenarios, and mothers' experiences with children with Autism Spectrum Disorder. Given the projects were at different stages of maturity, the students implemented varied research skills such as online data collection, recruitment of participants as per the study's inclusion criteria, data cleaning, and preliminary data analysis. We conducted online meetings at every stage of the project, which further enhanced student learning. This initiative supports both faculty and students and I have continued working with a few Research Assistants at the research center, Social Psychology Research Lab.

REFLECTIONS ON MY POSTGRADUATE DISSERTATION JOURNEY

HOW DID YOU CHOOSE YOUR TOPIC?

Living in a fast-changing world made me think of a topic that could help organisations, leaders, and HR professionals to better collaborate and sustain in the future. Organisations depend on their employees to achieve their goals and success; therefore, the idea of encouraging employees to go above and beyond their job role behaviour (organisational citizenship behaviour – OCB) Scouring through articles, I came to mind. identified how female expatriates expand the global workforce's highly skilled talent pool. Being an expatriate working mother in Dubai trying to manage work and personal life, leaving little time for everything else, made me think about engaging in more OCB. Hence, I decided to focus my research on analysing OCB of expatriate working women in Dubai. The dual roles of working mothers have both social psychological impact that organisations need to consider.

WHAT WAS YOUR STUDY'S DESIGN?

The research design was based on the 'onion' model by Saunders and colleagues. This model helped me at the initial stage of the research and in writing the dissertation's methodology chapter. Each layer of the onion model sheds light on essential choices of the data collection and analysis. Following this model ensured using the proper criteria through the study.

The research aimed to delve into the different insights of working women in Dubai. Their unique experiences and perspectives about OCB made an interpretivist philosophy the best approach, as it seeks out details of a situation and attempts to discover the reality behind participants' perception. The study was qualitative research to obtain the depth of information and meet the topic's exploratory nature. The qualitative method allowed participants to discuss and elaborate on the topic in ways that were important to them.

WHAT STRATEGIES DID YOU USE TO COMPLETE YOUR WORK ON TIME?

Being a working mother with a busy daily management schedule made time planning-in-advance a core strategy. Setting weekly goals, writing tracker, small milestones, and deadlines helped my progress status. Furthermore, selecting a topic early in my programme and ensuring the topic is doable in 9 months was another key strategy. I believe the research proposal would help any student in scouring different articles and ensuring there is enough material to support the topic. Additionally, being proactive and seeking feedback from your supervisor, when needed, helped in ensuring work is done correctly. Also, I cannot ignore the fact that developing a support group helped my physical and emotional well-being. Reflecting and sharing my feelings with the support group was a release practice, which helped clear the mind and sorted the thoughts.

The last strategy would be familiarising yourself and using the proper tools available at Middlesex Dubai University. While not every tool applied to my dissertation, but I used a few of them that were important in managing my data and reference and made my research journey easier.

HOW DID COVID-19 IMPACT YOUR TIMELINE ON THE PROJECT?

The COVID-19 situation had both a negative and positive impact on me. Negatively, in the way working from home and social commitments were exhausting. Additionally, COVID-19 forced me to change the methodology of collecting primary data; from face-to-face interviews to online meetings. Also, the industry background was changed due to limited resources and lack of accessibility due to the lockdown.

On the positive side, COVID-19 saved the social time that I had to do on weekends. I could spend more time working on the research on weekends as there were no other activities. Also, COVID-19 helped me to build new personal skills and strengthen existing competencies that were needed to move through times of change.

SOME TIPS FOR SUCCESS FOR THIS YEAR'S STUDENTS:

- 1. Put reasonable effort and time into the research proposal as it will be the foundation for your dissertation
- 2. Download academic phrase bank by Dr. John Morley. This helps to enrich the dissertation with academic phrases and to avoid repetition of phrases.
- 3. Attend the dissertation boot camps hosted by Middlesex University and reach out to MDX staff for help (i.e. librarian, CAS).
- 4. Essential tools for your dissertation:
 - a. Mendeley
 - b. Cite them right
 - c. Excel sheet
- 5. Do not compare yourself to other students doing the dissertation.
- 6. Reference your citations as you write. Do not keep it to the last moment as you may forget things.
- 7. Write in one main document and do not create other sub-documents as this might create confusion.
- 8. Ensure that you have the right template, title page, cover page, and all other requirements in your main document from the start.
- 9. Take some time off; it is absolutely needed.
- 10. Set your deadline 3-4 weeks before the actual deadline, as you may need extra time

MDX (VIRTUAL) FACULTY RESEARCH BOOT CAMP SUMMER 2020

Summer 2020 marked the beginning of the 100% online version of the Faculty Research Boot camp. Another highlight of the 2020 virtual mode was the introduction of panel sessions by senior researchers at MDX Dubai to share their research experiences over the years. It must be highlighted that the 2020 boot camp was by far the best attended, with total participation was 475 participants across the 13 sessions. The MDX Research Committee had launched the summer boot camp in 2015 to support faculty research and development. Each year, the boot camp evolved and expanded by introducing innovative structures to cater to faculty's particular needs. Each session is designed to make the faculty aware of the various new technologies and tools that are being made available to us.

In 2020, the boot camp's core theme was to explore a range of methodologies that could be implemented in the virtual world. The sessions also focused on the implications of virtual modes of data collection, emphasising primary and secondary sources. Senior researchers also covered different research types, which would be very useful in complementing mainstream research studies. A useful part of the boot camp is to share ideas on increasing publication visibility and build an online research profile. The first session was dedicated to illustrating the impact of research and identifying journals to publish in. The tools introduced were the Middlesex University Research Repository, Open Researcher and Contributor ID, Scopus, Google Scholar, Mendeley, Publons, Research Gate, and LinkedIn.


'Applied, Action, and Evaluation Research' examined the purpose and benefits of action research in education and provided a framework for doing action research. 'Content Analysis' looked into different types of brainstorm ideas within each discipline, highlighting useful resources and common pitfalls in content analysis design. The session on 'Bibliometric Analysis' analysed existing research output scientifically and statistically - it included a hands-on session of conducting bibliometric analysis on Web of Science data using VOSViewer, to assess patterns and trends in the existing literature.

The panel session on Multidisciplinary Research (MR) saw an intense discussion on the common research framework's effective methods, which included Technical Design, Conceptual Design, Execution and Integration. Each layer was explored further on how multidisciplinary research would fit the framework and the challenges in such multidisciplinary projects. A second panel deliberated on the benefits and challenges of collecting data online, in surveys, focus groups, and interviews. Panellists shared their experiences and insights on best practices.

Primary and secondary data collection methods were covered over several sessions dedicated to data collection tools and applications. Secondary data sources were introduced through various open datasets and public database platforms, including interesting segments on COVID-19 and Social Media data extraction tools.

The session on Qualtrics, a useful survey research tool for primary data collection, covered the software application to create, manage, distribute surveys, and generate survey reports. The Qualtrics advanced session explored question types and features such as survey randomisation, piped text, Qualtrics library, contacts library, anonymising, restricting, and generating customised survey links for respondents. Sessions on NVIVO introduced Qualitative Data Analysis to investigate Social Media Data; analyse survey data; run advanced queries like Matrix Coding, Cross-tabs, Coding comparison query, inter-rater reliability, etc.

The MDX Student Research Boot Camp was delivered as a 100% online series, including several CAS and the Research Committee sessions. The sessions offered regular boot camp sessions as well as a dedicated SPSS programme. The sessions were open to all PG Dissertation and Final Project students.

The boot camp lasted three weeks which witnessed 393 participants in the regular sessions and another 88 students in the special SPSS sessions. The boot camp sessions were organised by the faculty members - Dr. Sreejith, Dr. Anita, Dr. Fehmida, Dr. Lynda, Dr. Nishtha, Dr. Krishnadas and Dr. Supriya. Laura Barber (Assistant Library Manager) delivered an insightful session on how students can use library resources to inform their dissertation literature search.

All research studies that include human participants must have ethical approval prior to collecting any data, including online research. Researchers were urged to avoid face-to-face data collection. Instead, they were directed to employ virtual tools to collect data online through email surveys, interviews via phone, WhatsApp contacts, video conference software, etc. Such virtual data collection now require additional ethical considerations, which were discussed during the Summer boot camps.

However, for secondary research that does not require any primary data collection or use of proprietary data, the full ethics form may not be required. A new Research Ethics Screening Form has been designed, which needs to be completed in case of research undertaken using secondary data sources. In cases where the data had to be acquired in person, it was mandated there should be a robust rationale for face-to-face data collection. Such a procedure would be viewed as high risk due to the pandemic situation and must be approved through a review of the Ethics Committee of Middlesex University Dubai.

The procedure for Ethics Approvals were also updated where a peer review process was introduced into the system. For student research, the ethics forms (and accompanying documents) needed to be submitted to the supervisor prior to the collection of data. Once approved, the supervisor should then share the same with a second reviewer for approval. If deemed as high risk, the Ethics Form needed to be forwarded to the Middlesex Dubai Research Committee for further review and approval.

NANO VIDEOS BY MIDDLESEX UNIVERSITY DUBAI LIBRARY

THE CENTRE FOR ACADEMIC SUCCESS, AND RESERCH COMMITTEE

A range of helpful nano videos has been created by the Library and CAS (Center for Academic Success) to facilitate dissertation research and academic writing. Students can access these videos via the Dubai Teaching and Learning Support page on Unihub.

A series of 4-minute videos have been recorded to support dissertation students' academic writings, helping them structure a research report, paraphrase, review existing literature, and carry out critical analyses. These complement the range of other longer virtual sessions and guides have been compiled by the CAS team.

The library resources have been organised into Subject Guides that bring together focused materials related to subject areas along with special instruction tutorials for using library search and avoiding plagiarism. Details on referencing and proofreading have been added in the short videos on Cite Them Right and Grammarly.

With the support of colleagues, the MDX Research Committee has created several nano videos to support their dissertation research. The short (4-5 minute) videos covered a range of key research topics: literature review, quantitative, qualitative and mixed methods, primary and secondary research, sampling, thematic analysis, and regression analysis. Further, several "How to Guides" for students to sustain their research remotely were developed. This includes step-by-step guides to access and download research software and programmes, online learning courses, and library databases.



The MDX Research Committee has successfully launched the MDX Dubai Faculty Peer Research Mentoring Programme in July 2020, a voluntary, one-year faculty-to-faculty peer-mentoring programme which is open to all full-time and part-time faculty members. The programme aims to provide research support and guidance to any faculty member, primarily early career researchers or anyone new or transitioning to research. This mentoring programme is expected to build our faculty research strengths, acquire key research competencies and skills required to become independent researchers, and develop research partnerships/collaborations.

The programme's launch was timely and in response to the boot camp survey results, in which more than 70% of our colleagues mentioned that they would like to have a research mentor. Since its launch, the mentoring program already include 16 mentees and 11 mentors. The programme has already proved to be a success with several colleagues publishing their academic research (first time publication) with their mentor.



INTERNATIONAL CONFERENCE ON INTELLIGENT ENVIRONMENTS (IE)



From June 21st to 24th 2021 the Department of Computer Engineering and Informatics team hosted the 17th International Conference on Intelligent Environments. This is a highly prestigious conference ranked B in the CORE ranking and is now recognized as a major annual venue in this area of research. The IE 2021 conference agenda spread over 4 days consisted of a packed agenda consisting of tutorials, workshops, full papers, short papers, and an industrial forum where we welcomed senior scientists, academicians, young researchers, industry partners and students from all over the world.

We were honoured to have Professor Edward A. Lee, Robert S. Pepper Distinguished Professor Emeritus, UC Berkeley, USA, and Bharathan Balaji, Research Scientist at Amazon as the Conference's keynote speakers. The IE 2021 conference welcomed submissions of original papers on all aspects of Intelligent Environments ranging from concepts and theoretical developments to advanced technologies and innovative applications. All submission were thoroughly reviewed by two or three independent reviewers from an international committee composed of members from both industry and academic. Acceptance rate of 36% was based on the relevance to the conference topics, clarity of presentation, originality and accuracy of results, and proposed solutions.


